I want to emphasise that the camp is still operating safely and effectively. Private bookings for the camp

continue to be available, and interested parties can book via the web page or by calling Legacy House. For our Legacy beneficiaries, there is no charge.

Extension of Allison's Contract

In light of the ongoing challenges and the outstanding work Allison has accomplished, the Board has determined that Legacy WA is not yet ready to commence the recruitment process for a permanent CEO. Consequently, Allison has been asked to extend her role as Transitional CEO for an additional 12 months. This extension will provide the necessary time to fully understand our long-term potential and develop strategies to ensure Legacy WA continues to offer support, opportunities, and connections to veterans' loved ones for the next century.



Our annual Disaster Relief Australia (DRA) work wrapped up just last week. Typically held in October, this year's event was moved to August due to specific circumstances. August is usually quite wet and challenging for such work, but we managed to avoid the worst of the rain and complete the job. The primary goal was to clear the fuel buildup in the nature reserve between Caves Road, the office, and east of the main entrance. This accumulation of dead trees, branches, and other debris posed a significant bushfire hazard. The DRA team, consisting of seven members, tackled the job efficiently with two large chainsaws, box trailers, and utes - we were fortunate to have a free tip pass to dispose of the waste.

Among the completed tasks was the removal of two unsightly commercial garbage bins that greeted visitors at the camp entrance. These bins, reminiscent of a dog's mess on a pristine lawn, have been replaced. The Decommissioning of HMAS ANZAC

Jacinta's Story

My name is Jacinta, and I'm a 24-year-old mother to three wonderful children: my four-year-old daughter, Lyla and twins Luca and Milena. My partner Luke, a Police Officer and reservist with the 16th Battalion of the Australian Army, passed away in February 2023 when I was 15 weeks pregnant with the twins. They are among Legacy's youngest beneficiaries.

The last 18 months have been extremely tough. I've faced major depressive disorder, anxiety, and PTSD while grieving, adjusting to life changes, and raising the babies. Despite these challenges, I continued working full-time until I was 37 weeks pregnant and have focused on my mental health through therapy and medical appointments. I've recently returned to work at WA Police with a supportive team.

Luca and Milena have been a tremendous source of healing for Lyla and me. They bring so much joy to our lives and have made this difficult time more bearable. We are blessed to have amazing support and love from those around us.

Lyla has been my rock through this journey, managing her own grief while being the best big sister imaginable. She is a wonderfully down-to-earth little girl with an immense amount of love for everyone, especially her twin siblings. Luca is a typical boy, already into all sorts of mischief, but he is also incredibly snuggly and sweet. Milena is a delightful little angel, so cheerful and affectionate. I feel truly blessed to have these three wonderful children to navigate life with.

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A Moving Tribute on Vietnam Veterans' Day

On 18 August, we marked Vietnam Veterans' Day, a day deeply etched in our collective memory as it coincides with the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan. This date serves as a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made by almost 60,000 Australians who served in the Vietnam War from 1962 to 1972.

Representing Legacy WA at this year's commemoration and laying a wreath in honour of the fallen was a profoundly moving experience. The ceremony underscored the depth of our collective gratitude and remembrance for those who served and sacrificed.

The Battle of Long Tan, fought on 18 August 1966, remains one of the most significant and intense engagements involving Australian forces during the Vietnam War. In the dense rubber plantations near Long Tan, soldiers from Delta Company, 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment faced an overwhelming force of approximately 2,000 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops. The battle unfolded under relentless tropical downpours and in exceedingly muddy conditions.

By the end of that day, 17 Australians had lost their lives and 25 were wounded, with one of the wounded later dying from his injuries. This battle resulted in the highest number of casualties in a single operation since the establishment of the Australian Task Force base at Nui Dat the previous April. The valour and tenacity displayed by our soldiers in such dire circumstances is a testament to their remarkable courage.

Vietnam Veterans' Day is not only a time to honour the specific events like the Battle of Long Tan, but to remember all the battles fought by Australian forces throughout the Vietnam War. We reflect on

the contributions of every member of the Australian military involved—whether they served on the ground, in the Royal Australian Navy or the Royal Australian Air Force. Each role, from combat to support, was integral to our efforts and deserves our deepest appreciation.


On this day, we pause to say 'thank you' to those who gave their lives during the conflict, returned home with wounds, illness, or injuries, have since passed away or continue to carry the physical and emotional scars of their service.

Beneficiary Spotlight Alison "Ann" James

At age two, "Ann's" father was sent to Staff College in Camberley, UK. Ann loved military parades but nearly died of heat stroke at age four while watching a horse show. Her father quickly used ice from a local fishmonger to cool her down and get her medical help.

Ann's early years included holidays to Ireland, Edinburgh, and Germany, where she learned ice skating—a passion she continued into her 80s. She excelled in sports like hockey, tennis, netball, and swimming, earning lifesaving certificates. Her Girl Guides involvement began young, and after moving to Western Australia in 1967, she led a group at City Beach, later becoming Ranger Guide Leader and Commissioner for Girl Guides in WA.

Ann was cared for by a German governess named Tut, who was tragically lost to the Gestapo when Hitler rose to power. At boarding school in the UK, Ann eagerly joined her family in India when invited by her father, a Brigadier in the Quetta Brigade.

During World War II, Ann's brother Captain John Christinson was killed in Burma in 1942, deeply affecting her. In 1945, she completed a five-month officers' course at Staff College in Quetta, graduating as a Captain and serving with Allied Land Forces in Southeast Asia.

Ann's life was marked by the significant date of 3 September: she married Captain Dennis Clode James on 3 September 1945, moved to Western Australia on 3 September 1963, and welcomed her granddaughter Caroline on 3 September 1980. Ann became an Australian citizen in 1976. Her husband, Dennis passed away on 2 October 2012, and Ann became a beneficiary of Legacy.

The energy, community involvement, and sheer zest of life for this lady is awe-inspiring.


My career with Legacy started way back around 1985 when I was attached to the RAP at SASR as a Medic. Around Christmas that year, I was asked to accompany the PTIs, cooks and members of training to be the Medic for the camp down at Busselton. Unbeknown to me there would be approximately 70 children of all ages up to 18 years of age about to step out and experience adventure, fun, games, and make new friends for life. They were all in the same boat (as to say) and did exercises from the crack of dawn until lights out for 12 days.

My job as the Medic was to look after everyone for coughs, colds and any injuries/medical problems that arose. I did this for three or four camps and found shortly thereafter, I was posted to 11 Field Ambulance in Queensland. As soon as they found out that I was the Medic for the camps in Perth, I was volunteered to do the Legacy Camps near Bathurst.

On my return to Perth, I found myself invited by Mike Radwell to a Legacy meeting in South Perth. Mike Radwell asked if I would like to become a Legatee and was sworn in that night. I did the training/information session and the rest is history.

During my first years in the Defence Force, I wasn't aware of any organisations that helped widows and their children with the hardships of losing their family members to war service. Because of my location (Baldivis), I was attached to the Mandurah Murray area. There, I was introduced to my first Newly Bereaved "client"; it opened my eyes to see how alone and afraid they were for the future. Thanks to my former OC, Colin Percell, and John Delgardo for guiding me, I would have remained unaware of how our beneficiaries managed, which deeply saddened me.

That made me even more determined to help out our extended families (beneficiaries). This desire comes from the lack of support services and information reaching our beneficiaries. The widows have lived a sheltered life being in the Defence Force, and to find themselves on their own is daunting/scary.



As a Legatee, I find myself as an informant/educator/ supporter and ear for my beneficiaries because today, I understand that to lose a network of friends and (military) family is the biggest hill to climb on their own. I love sitting and chewing the fat with my beneficiaries. If I sit at their home for 1 hour or 4 hours to assist them in their transition of their massive loss, I will. My visits have no time limit, and I don't mind going backwards and forwards to calm the anxiety of my beneficiaries. I think the words "Lest we Forget," also extends to our beneficiaries.

I love what I do, but I couldn't do what I do without the support of Kathryn, Joanna and Tracey from the Legacy Team.

Paul is an honourable edition to the Legacy Community, and we are very grateful for his dedicated support and commitment to our beneficiaries.






Ruth celebrated with a family dinner and with visits from friends and colleague.

Alison attributed her long life to keeping active and being surrounded by a wonderful family.




